3 BIN SYSTEM

- 1. <u>Non-Perishables</u>: This bin stays under lock and key to make it more difficult to pilfer from it during the year. In this one store: batteries, rope, flashlights, radios, gloves, paper goods and such.
- 2. <u>Perishables</u>: This is the stuff that won't last more than one hurricane season. By the end of May, stock it with canned goods, shelf milk, cereal, peanut butter and jelly and other good stuff. At the end of the season, bring it into your kitchen or donate it to charity.
- 3. <u>Valuables</u>: This is a watertight bin with a good solid latch. In here, place any valuable documents, financial records, photos or other non-waterproof items that have not already been placed in a safe-deposit box (highly recommended).
